BOARD REPORTS

President's Report

Elections

Members began voting at the published time of 6:30 p.m. Chapter election official Vicki Rhodes, assisted by Election Committee members Ed Dandar, Ursula Dandar, Brenda Schilinski, & Marla Cruz checked members' IWLA membership cards and a second government-issued identification to verify eligibility to vote, and provided each voter a single ballot containing the names of the candidates. Completed ballots were then placed in the secure ballot box under the control of Vicki Rhodes. LAKE AND CONSERVATION REPORT

Lake Neff

Trashed

Please clean up after fishing. We are finding garbage on a regular basis along the lake including fast food wrappers, empty bait containers and broken lures/worms. Please also remove the used fishing line. Fishing line causes issues with the equipment we use for mowing. The white tubes around the lake are for used fishing line only. Do not put anything else in those tubes.

Stocking

The Lake and Conservation Committee voted last year to stock bait this year. Thousands of minnows, rosies, and shad are being added to the lake to boost the ecosystem. Members will see the effect of this stocking with catching much larger fish. It is important to continually boost the lake with food sources that self-replicate. While many of these fish will be eaten soon after stocking, the survivors will reproduce in the lake providing a continual food source.

Chapter Grounds

We are seeing many snakes this year. Watch where you are walking! Most of the snakes are harmless but several venomous snakes have been seen. I asked a local pest control professional about the snake population, and he has also



seen a marked increase this year primarily because the mild winter caused the rodent population to spike.

Most are harmless rat snakes, but a few have reported seeing juvenile copperheads. You can read more about telling juvenile snakes apart in <u>Other News</u>.


OTHER NEWS

Snakes Alive!

Is it a copperhead? Or a juvenile rat snake? Just what kind of hideous creature is this thing?

I, your humble editor, don't actually find them hideous. At one point in my young life, I wanted to be a herpetologist. I read Lawrence Klauber's book <u>Rattlesnakes: Their Habits,</u> <u>Life Histories, and Influence on Mankind</u>. I caught and kept rattlesnakes while growing up in Southern California. Here in Northern Virginia, we have different snakes.

Building a raised bed garden for Mrs. Editor a few years ago, I unearthed an old rat snake nest. They're thick *chez nous*. One thing I noticed was the markings on the juvenile rat snakes make them hard to distinguish from copperheads.





However, on close inspection, two striking differences stand out:

- 1. The juvenile rat snake has distinctive markings on the head, including a dark eye stripe. The juvenile copperhead, however, has an unpatterned, copper-colored head.
- The tail of the juvenile copperhead is bright yellow.
 The tail of the juvenile rat snake is a continued pattern of the body.

As with all snakes... well, all wildlife, leave them alone in their environment. They're where they belong. Even in our yards. If you think you have a copperhead in your yard, contact a professional.
