
## **BOARD REPORTS**

This year has seen several events at our shotgun range including Boy Scouts, Trail life, Young Marines, Armed Women of America and even a couple family groups coming to the range as new shooters and walk away with a grin on their face broken clays on the ground and of course the shell casing of the first clay target they ever broke. This coming year we invite all our members and guests to come and enjoy your Dr. Green Shotgun Range. We are fortunate to have several certified instructors both in NRA and NSCA shotgun shooting. No shotgun, no problem, we have both youth/ladies and adult shotguns along with all the safety gear you will need to go through the course. We will be setting up dates for 2024 and would like to include you and your family the opportunity a "Learn to Shoot" and break your first clay.

#### Precision Rifle & Bullseye Pistol – CEASE FIRE

The leaves are falling, the air is turning cool, and the evenings are growing shorter. It's that time of year when we reflect back on an excellent year of precision pistol and rifle shooting. Some quick stats:

5,040 Rounds Fired

462 / 600 Average Pistol Score 370 / 400 Average Rifle Sore

Our average pistol score in May and October was 447 and 457, respectively. And our average rifle score in May and October was 364 and 372, respectively. These scores are already very strong, and high enough to where small gains are hard to achieve, so this improvement is noteworthy.




As you read this and think to yourself, "self, I'm going to dust off that .22 in the safe and put it to work next season," I invite you to come down to your chapter this winter and practice using the course of fire and targets used in NRA competition, so you can ready yourself and your gun for next year! We use the Bullseye Match app (link: <a href="https://www.bullseyematch.app">https://www.bullseyematch.app</a>), available for Android, iOS, and Windows. It's set up for Bullseye Pistol, but it also works well for the Timed Fire portion of Precision Rifle.

If you want to run a Precision Rifle match, you'll need two of the B-19 (or B-19C) targets...one for Slow Fire and one for Timed Fire. For Bullseye Pistol, you'll need one B-16 target for Slow Fire, and two B-8 targets...one for Timed Fire and one for Rapid Fire. See the May 2023 newsletter for a full run-down of the courses of fire for each shooting discipline.


NRA B-19C Target
