LAKE AND CONSERVATION REPORT

Lake Neff

Stocking Plans

Event dates and stocking schedules have been set and sent to the Board of Directors for approval. The committee needs to place our order with our vendors as soon as possible.

New Fish Moving In

The chapter has been working with a former member who is a land developer in Northern Virginia. He has a situation where a 4 acre lake must be drained to repair the dam. We have agreed to take all of the fish from the lake into Lake Neff. The transfer will include shocking the lake then loading the fish into an aerated transport and will be completed by a professional company. The transfer was supposed to happen but is now tied up in concerns/logistics from the HOA. The 35 year old pond is located in Herndon and is landlocked.

Good Silt News

An unscientific review of Lake Neff indicates about a 2 foot drop in silt levels around the pond. About 15 measurements were taken around the pond with positive results with silt levels between 1/2 foot and 2 feet. Previous measurements indicated 3-4 feet across the pond. Behind the silt dam, silt levels are between 4-6 feet. The silt levels are dropping because of the aerators cycling bacteria from the top of the lake to the organic material on the bottom. Unscientific reviews indicate healthy levels of zooplankton and phytoplankton which are primary food sources for minnows and small fish.

Conservation

Budget Update

The 2024 Lake and Conservation proposed budget has been submitted to the treasurer for review based on the November 8 committee meeting.

The primary expense for 2024 is the repair and possible replacement of the handicapped fishing pier. The pier was originally built in 2007 and needs an overall structural review with replacement of key components. More than likely the dock will be closed soon as the inspections begin. A permit will be required from the county for the rebuild. Initial reviews of the concrete foundation indicated that it is sound.

Chapter Workdays

The committee has suggested that the first Saturday of every month be a chapter workday. Other committees can provide input and assistance for work in their areas that needs to be completed.

Tree of Heaven Abatement

We had a conference call with our USDA contact and we will not be able to remove the trees of heaven for up to 2 years. We will begin killing them ASAP but cannot cut them down until they are completely dead otherwise they will spawn (up to 50 new shoots) and spread from the roots. As these trees are cut down, they will be used to backfill the berms on the rifle pistol range. We will be closing the shotgun project this winter with reimbursements expected of about \$200.

Campsites

The Arico campsite was tilled and reseeded for the fall. The site was primarily covered in Japanese stilt grass (invasive) and is now seeded with natural, cover and hardy grasses.

Eagle Scout Project – Aiden Ockerman, T-63

Life Scout Aiden Ockerman from Troop 63 in Winchester completed an Eagle Scout project at the chapter that was greatly needed! Aiden built a Fire Danger sign at the entrance to the campground that will alert campers of the

current fire status. Already this year we have banned all campfires and we have had two weekends with very high fire dangers.

Aiden was helped in his project by fellow boys scouts Robbie Spezzano, Justin and Lucas Hayes, and Kyle Johnson.

Aiden is the son of Mike and Codie Ockerman and attends Millbrook High



School. He runs track and is a member of the 4H Trap shooting team. Aiden interns at Winchester Airport and will





be working on his pilot's license in December. We wish **Aiden** the best of luck on his Eagle Board of Honor.
